







With summer upon us, here's something that might help you get the yard done a little faster this year: The Dixie Chopper Xtreme is the world's fastest lawnmower. It has a

An economical three-wheel car? What'll they think of next? Here's looking at the **Aptera**. The prototype under construction will be powered by a single-cylinder, 12-horsepower diesel engine and a 25-horsepower DC electric motor, and will have a continuously variable transmission. Power is delivered through a single rear wheel mounted on a composite swing arm. The car is expected to have an electronically limited top speed of 95 miles per hour and an estimated 0-to-60-mph acceleration of 11 seconds.
